\$1,495,000 Project Period 2011 to 2014 - Bureau of Justice Assistance Grant to provide operational enhancement funds for Magistrate DWI Drug Courts.

The Coal Mine Reclamation Program – regulates, inspects and enforces all coal mines not on Indian Reservations within the State of New Mexico. The program is part of the Mining and Minerals Division. I served as Fiscal Officer for this project and was responsible for the production and submission of the annual grant application. I coauthored the application, provided projections and financial analysis, and once funding was received was responsible for all financial related aspects of the funds including all financial accounts and audits, contracts, purchases and procurement and drawdown of funds.

Abandoned Mine Land Program – works with grants from the federal government to identify, safeguard and reclaim (pre-1977) abandoned mines that present a public safety hazard or environmental detriment. The program is part of the Mining and Minerals Division. I served as Fiscal Officer for this project and was responsible for the production and submission of the annual grant application. I coauthored the application, provided projections and financial analysis, and once funding was received was responsible for all financial related aspects of the funds including all financial accounts and audits, contracts, purchases and procurement and drawdown of funds.

\$600,000 **CDBG – 1996 Phase I, and 1997 Phase II, San Antonio, Water System Improvement**
\$40,000 Match by County of Socorro
\$10,000 Match by the San Antonio Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association

Phase I (1996) of this project provided for a public water supply to replace private domestic wells and to reduce the potential threats to the drinking water supply from septic tanks, cesspool contaminants and other liquid waste. The project included placement of one 60,000 gallon water storage tank, 15,000 linear feet of 4 and 6 inch PVC pipelines within the San Antonio and San Pedro area; 35 new water services, transfer of approximately 26 new water services; and installation of 110 double-check back flow prevention valves.

Phase II (1997) included additional PVC piping, dual check valves, new water services and new fire hydrants. Fire hydrants were provided to prevent a future reoccurrence of the 1996 fire that destroyed hundreds of acres of cotton wood in the Bosque Del Apache Reserve.

\$300,000 **CDBG – 1996 Magdalena, Street and Drainage Improvements Project**
\$97,710 Match by Village of Magdalena and State Highway Co-op

This project provided for street and drainage improvements on 10 streets within the village; total length approximately 8,106 feet. The streets were paved with chip seal, 2 pass oil penetration together with sub grade preparation, curb and gutter, new base course, concrete curb returns, prime coat and concrete valley gutters.

\$300,000 **CDBG – 1995 Magdalena, Water System Improvements Project**
\$250,000 State Appropriation

This project provided for new control metering chlorination building, rehab of pump house, drilling one well, one 250,000 gallon water storage tank, approximately 12,500 feet of 6 inch and 8 inch PVC transmission line, 28 fire hydrants and ancillary items.

\$600,000 **CDBG – 1995 Phase I and 1996 Phase II, City of Socorro, Street and Drainage Improvements**
\$80,000 Match by City of Socorro

This project provided flood relief to the north Sixth Street area. Included in the improvements were a storm sewer ditch system, the removal of existing pavement and

installation of base course, asphalt paving, concrete curb and gutter, valley gutters and residential drive pads. The street was widened to 30 feet.

\$300,000 **CDBG – 1997 Polvadera, Water System Improvements**
\$10,000 Match by County of Socorro
\$10,000 Match by Polvadera Mutual Domestic Water Consumers Association

This project provided water system improvements for the Lemitar, Polvadera and Escondida communities. Improvements included a 200,000 gallon water storage tank, one new well, increased electrical power to one well, 22,000 linear feet of 6-inch PVC water transmission line, connection of 50 new services and installation of 4 fire hydrants.

\$300,000 **CDBG – 1996 County of Socorro, Senior Center**
\$14,000 Match by County of Socorro
\$8,000 City/County Senior Citizen's Program
LAND Donated by the New Mexico Boys and Girls Ranch

This project provided for architectural fees, construction and equipment for a 3,700 square foot senior citizens center in northern Socorro County.

\$300,000 **CDBG – 1997 City of Socorro, Street and Drainage Improvements, Hefner Addition**
\$32,000 Match by City of Socorro

This project provided for improved access and enhanced water drainage. Improvements included pavement, curb and gutter and sidewalks.

\$199,332 **CDBG – 1994 County of Socorro, Solid Waste System Improvements**
\$450,000 Match by County (provided by State Appropriation).

This state appropriation served all of Socorro County. A combination of funding from the City of Socorro and Village of Magdalena accomplished the construction of a material solid waste recovery transfer station. The Alamo Reservation of the Navajo Nation Stallion Site and New Mexico Mining and Technology were also allowed to transfer to the facility.

**Special Appropriation Grants from State of New Mexico

\$1,340,000 **1994 Domestic Violence Shelter**

This project combined City of Las Cruces and County of Dona Ana Community Development Block Grants plus state appropriations in an effort to renovate a National Guard Armory building donated to the 30,000 square foot facility to house the victims of domestic violence.

\$575,000 1994 DWI Project

This grant combined state and federal grants to provide funding for the prevention of Driving While Intoxicated (DWI) program within Dona Ana County. As Grant Coordinator, I supervised the Adult Program Director, the Teen Project Coordinator and Secretary who were responsible for daily functioning of the DWI program.

\$450,000 1994 Public Health Office for Las Cruces New Mexico

This state appropriation provided for the renovation of the old Smith's grocery store on Solano Drive to facilitate the New Mexico Public Health Office. Architectural and construction fees were included to facilitate parking improvements and fencing. Project was under construction at the time of my departure.

\$200,000 1994 Public Health Office for Chaparral

This state appropriation included funding for architectural fees and construction of a public health facility for the community of Chaparral in southern New Mexico. Funding had been secured.

\$200,000 1994 Public Health Office for East Mesa

This state appropriation included funding for property acquisition, architectural fees and construction of a public health facility for the East Mesa adjacent to the city of Las Cruces. Funding had been secured at the time of my departure.

\$85,000 1994 Dona Ana Community Center

This state appropriation included funding for renovation of the Dona Ana Community Center including, kitchen and meal site upgrade and roofing. Project was in construction at the time of my departure.

\$100,000 1994 Salem Playground, Dona Ana County

This state special appropriation provided for playground equipment, a basketball court and fencing of the perimeter of a community play area in the community of Salem. Funding had been secured at the time of my departure.
